He reports that two new graduate students are working on geography and gender issues in this program. **Cindy Holmes** is undertaking a PhD study of "Homonormativity, Space, and Intimate Partner Violence Among Lesbian Couples." She will be presenting some of her earlier work on white homonormativity at the San Francisco AAG meetings. **Sheila Lewis** is working on a MA study of the "Marginalisation of Aboriginal Women in the Urban Housing Market, Kelowna, BC, Canada". Sheila is recipient of a fellowship from the UBC Centre for Human Rights, Diversity & Identity.

Ellen Hansen has been honored as the 2007 recipient of the Ruth Schillinger Award at Emporia State University, Kansas. The award annually recognizes a woman faculty member who has made extraordinary contributions to the women of Emporia State over a sustained period. Congratulations Ellen!

Congratulations to **Lynda Johnston** who was recently promoted to Associate Professor at the University of Waikato (New Zealand). As of January 2007 she became chairperson of the department. Lynda and **Robyn Longhurst** are collaborating on a book provisionally entitled 'Space, Place and Sex: Geographies of Sexualities' with the

US publishers Rowman and Littlefield. With **Elsie Ho** they also have a new research project "We are where we eat': food, place and identity for new migrant women."

Polly Vauquiline was awarded a Doctoral degree in March 2007 by the Department of Geography, North-Eastern Hill University, Shillong, India (www.nehu.ac.in) for her thesis on "Gender-Related Crimes in Greater Guwahati Urban Area" under the supervision of Prof.A.C.Mohapatra. Guwahati, with a population of about one million, is the capital city of the State of Assam.

Anne Buttimer, past President of the International Geographical Union, is now the liaison for the IGU Executive Committee to the Commission on Gender and Geography. She has two recent publications dealing with international perspectives in geography a book dealing with geography in Sweden (see below) and a co-edited special issue of *Geographical Review* (2006) commemorating the 200th anniversary of Humboldt's visit to Philadelphia.

Yoga Rasanayagam (Sri Lanka) has retired from her position as Professor of Geography and Dean of the Faculty of Arts at the University of Colombo and is working as Academic Advisor at the National Institute of Social Development in Colombo. She is co-author of a recent article on gender equity in Sri Lankan higher education (see below).

Nancy Lewis (East-West Center, Hawaii) delivered the Evelyn Pruitt Lecture March 30, 2007 on "Is Globalization Good for your Health"? at Louisiana State University, USA. The annual lecture, funded by a bequest from the late Evelyn Pruitt, a geographer with a long and distinguished career in the US government focusing on coastal studies, supports a presentation by a senior woman geographer. Ms. Pruitt also endowed grants for research by women students awarded the Society of Woman Geographers. Nancy is also involved with preparations for the 21st Pacific Science Congress which will be held in Okinawa, June 12-18, 2007. The Congress theme is "Diversity and Change: Challenges and Opportunities form Managing Natural and Social Systems in Asia-Pacific".

Teresa Vicente Mosquete reports on two programs held in March at the University of Salamanca which brought together Spanish and Italian geographers. "Mujer y Sociedad," coordinated by the Department of Geography for the Interdepartmental Doctorate in Interdisciplinary Gender Studies, featured **Rachelle Borghi** (Universidad Ca' Foscari, Venecia, Italia) speaking on women and public spaces in Morocco, **Marcella Schmidt di Friedberg** (Universidad Milano-Bicocca, Italia) on the critical discourse on nature, gender, and ecofeminism, **Rocío Sánchez Ameijeiras** (Universidad Santiago de Compostela) on feminine bodies and body metaphors: a new look at medieval art, and **Begoña San José** (Forum de Política Feminista} on maternity, paternity, employment, and parity of representation. Rachelle Borghi and Marcella Schmidt di Friedberg also participated in a methodological seminar that addressed perspectives on gender, feminism, environment, and postcolonialism.
